FUNDAMENTALS OF ECOSYSTEMS

UNDERSTANDING ECOSYSTEMS IS CENTRAL TO AP ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE CHAPTER 3, AS ECOSYSTEMS REPRESENT COMMUNITIES OF LIVING ORGANISMS INTERACTING WITH THEIR PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENTS. AN ECOSYSTEM INCLUDES BOTH BIOTIC COMPONENTS, SUCH AS PLANTS, ANIMALS, AND MICROORGANISMS, AND ABIOTIC FACTORS LIKE WATER, SOIL, AND CLIMATE. THESE COMPONENTS ARE INTERCONNECTED THROUGH VARIOUS PROCESSES THAT SUSTAIN LIFE AND MAINTAIN ECOLOGICAL BALANCE.

ECOSYSTEM STRUCTURE AND COMPONENTS

EVERY ECOSYSTEM IS COMPOSED OF PRODUCERS, CONSUMERS, AND DECOMPOSERS, WHICH TOGETHER FORM A COMPLEX NETWORK OF RELATIONSHIPS. PRODUCERS, PRIMARILY GREEN PLANTS AND ALGAE, CONVERT SOLAR ENERGY INTO CHEMICAL ENERGY VIA PHOTOSYNTHESIS. CONSUMERS ARE ORGANISMS THAT FEED ON PRODUCERS OR OTHER CONSUMERS, CATEGORIZED INTO HERBIVORES, CARNIVORES, OMNIVORES, AND DETRITIVORES. DECOMPOSERS, SUCH AS FUNGI AND BACTERIA, BREAK DOWN ORGANIC MATTER, RECYCLING NUTRIENTS BACK INTO THE ECOSYSTEM.

TYPES OF ECOSYSTEMS

ECOSYSTEMS VARY WIDELY AND CAN BE TERRESTRIAL, FRESHWATER, OR MARINE. TERRESTRIAL ECOSYSTEMS INCLUDE FORESTS, GRASSLANDS, AND DESERTS, EACH CHARACTERIZED BY DISTINCT CLIMATE CONDITIONS AND SPECIES COMPOSITIONS. FRESHWATER ECOSYSTEMS ENCOMPASS LAKES, RIVERS, AND WETLANDS, WHILE MARINE ECOSYSTEMS INCLUDE OCEANS, CORAL REEFS, AND ESTUARIES. THE DIVERSITY OF ECOSYSTEMS REFLECTS THE ADAPTABILITY OF LIFE TO DIFFERENT ENVIRONMENTAL CONDITIONS.

ENERGY FLOW IN ECOSYSTEMS

ENERGY FLOW IS A CRITICAL TOPIC IN AP ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE CHAPTER 3, ILLUSTRATING HOW ENERGY ENTERS, MOVES

THROUGH, AND EXITS ECOSYSTEMS. UNLIKE MATTER, ENERGY FLOWS IN A ONE-WAY DIRECTION AND IS ESSENTIAL FOR SUSTAINING BIOLOGICAL PROCESSES. THE SUN IS THE PRIMARY ENERGY SOURCE, DRIVING PHOTOSYNTHESIS AND SUPPORTING LIFE ON EARTH.

TROPHIC LEVELS AND FOOD CHAINS

TROPHIC LEVELS REPRESENT THE HIERARCHICAL POSITIONS OF ORGANISMS IN AN ECOSYSTEM BASED ON THEIR FEEDING RELATIONSHIPS. THE SEQUENCE BEGINS WITH PRODUCERS AT THE BASE, FOLLOWED BY PRIMARY CONSUMERS (HERBIVORES), SECONDARY CONSUMERS (CARNIVORES THAT EAT HERBIVORES), TERTIARY CONSUMERS, AND APEX PREDATORS AT THE TOP. FOOD CHAINS DEPICT LINEAR ENERGY TRANSFER FROM ONE ORGANISM TO THE NEXT, BUT IN REALITY, FOOD WEBS, WHICH ARE INTERCONNECTED FOOD CHAINS, BETTER REPRESENT ECOSYSTEM COMPLEXITY.

ENERGY TRANSFER EFFICIENCY

ENERGY TRANSFER BETWEEN TROPHIC LEVELS IS INEFFICIENT, WITH ONLY ABOUT 10% OF THE ENERGY AT ONE LEVEL PASSED TO THE NEXT. THIS LOSS OCCURS MAINLY AS HEAT DUE TO METABOLIC PROCESSES. CONSEQUENTLY, ENERGY PYRAMIDS ILLUSTRATE THE DECREASING AMOUNT OF USABLE ENERGY AVAILABLE AT HIGHER TROPHIC LEVELS, EXPLAINING WHY ECOSYSTEMS TYPICALLY SUPPORT FEWER TOP-LEVEL CONSUMERS.

PRIMARY PRODUCTIVITY

PRIMARY PRODUCTIVITY MEASURES THE RATE AT WHICH PRODUCERS CONVERT SOLAR ENERGY INTO CHEMICAL ENERGY. GROSS PRIMARY PRODUCTIVITY (GPP) IS THE TOTAL ENERGY CAPTURED, WHILE NET PRIMARY PRODUCTIVITY (NPP) IS THE ENERGY REMAINING AFTER PRODUCERS USE SOME FOR RESPIRATION. NPP REPRESENTS THE ENERGY AVAILABLE TO CONSUMERS AND IS A KEY INDICATOR OF ECOSYSTEM HEALTH AND CAPACITY TO SUPPORT LIFE.

BIOGEOCHEMICAL CYCLES

BIOGEOCHEMICAL CYCLES DESCRIBE THE MOVEMENT OF ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS AND COMPOUNDS THROUGH LIVING ORGANISMS AND THE PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT. THESE CYCLES ENSURE THE RECYCLING OF NUTRIENTS NECESSARY FOR LIFE AND ARE A CRUCIAL FOCUS OF AP ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE CHAPTER 3.

CARBON CYCLE

THE CARBON CYCLE INVOLVES THE EXCHANGE OF CARBON AMONG THE ATMOSPHERE, BIOSPHERE, HYDROSPHERE, AND GEOSPHERE. PHOTOSYNTHESIS REMOVES CARBON DIOXIDE FROM THE ATMOSPHERE, CONVERTING IT INTO ORGANIC MOLECULES. CELLULAR RESPIRATION, DECOMPOSITION, AND COMBUSTION RELEASE CARBON BACK INTO THE ATMOSPHERE. HUMAN ACTIVITIES, SUCH AS FOSSIL FUEL BURNING AND DEFORESTATION, HAVE SIGNIFICANTLY ALTERED THE NATURAL CARBON CYCLE, CONTRIBUTING TO CLIMATE CHANGE.

NITROGEN CYCLE

NITROGEN IS VITAL FOR PROTEINS AND NUCLEIC ACIDS, BUT ATMOSPHERIC NITROGEN (N_2) IS UNUSABLE BY MOST ORGANISMS. THE NITROGEN CYCLE INCLUDES NITROGEN FIXATION BY BACTERIA, CONVERTING N_2 INTO FORMS LIKE AMMONIA AND NITRATES THAT PLANTS CAN ABSORB. ADDITIONAL STEPS INCLUDE NITRIFICATION, ASSIMILATION, AMMONIFICATION, AND DENITRIFICATION, WHICH COLLECTIVELY MAINTAIN NITROGEN AVAILABILITY.

PHOSPHORUS CYCLE

THE PHOSPHORUS CYCLE IS UNIQUE BECAUSE PHOSPHORUS DOES NOT HAVE A GASEOUS PHASE UNDER NORMAL CONDITIONS. IT CYCLES THROUGH ROCKS, WATER, SOIL, AND LIVING ORGANISMS. PHOSPHORUS IS ESSENTIAL FOR DNA, ATP, AND CELL MEMBRANES. WEATHERING RELEASES PHOSPHATE INTO SOILS AND WATER, WHERE PLANTS ABSORB IT. HUMAN ACTIVITIES, SUCH AS FERTILIZER USE, CAN DISRUPT THIS CYCLE, LEADING TO EUTROPHICATION IN AQUATIC SYSTEMS.

WATER CYCLE

THE WATER CYCLE, OR HYDROLOGIC CYCLE, DESCRIBES THE CONTINUOUS MOVEMENT OF WATER THROUGH EVAPORATION, CONDENSATION, PRECIPITATION, INFILTRATION, AND RUNOFF. THIS CYCLE REGULATES CLIMATE, SUPPORTS ALL LIVING ORGANISMS, AND INFLUENCES OTHER BIOGEOCHEMICAL CYCLES. WATER AVAILABILITY AND QUALITY ARE CENTRAL CONCERNS IN ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE.

POPULATION ECOLOGY

POPULATION ECOLOGY EXAMINES THE DYNAMICS OF SPECIES POPULATIONS AND HOW THEY INTERACT WITH THEIR ENVIRONMENT. THIS SECTION OF AP ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE CHAPTER 3 COVERS FACTORS AFFECTING POPULATION SIZE, GROWTH PATTERNS, AND THE IMPACT OF LIMITING RESOURCES.

POPULATION GROWTH MODELS

POPULATIONS CAN GROW ACCORDING TO EXPONENTIAL OR LOGISTIC MODELS. EXPONENTIAL GROWTH OCCURS WHEN RESOURCES ARE UNLIMITED, RESULTING IN RAPID POPULATION INCREASE. LOGISTIC GROWTH CONSIDERS ENVIRONMENTAL CARRYING CAPACITY, CAUSING GROWTH TO SLOW AND STABILIZE AS RESOURCES BECOME LIMITED. UNDERSTANDING THESE MODELS IS CRUCIAL FOR PREDICTING SPECIES POPULATION TRENDS AND MANAGING ECOSYSTEMS.

CARRYING CAPACITY AND LIMITING FACTORS

CARRYING CAPACITY IS THE MAXIMUM POPULATION SIZE AN ENVIRONMENT CAN SUSTAIN INDEFINITELY. FACTORS LIMITING POPULATION GROWTH INCLUDE AVAILABILITY OF FOOD, WATER, SHELTER, PREDATION, DISEASE, AND COMPETITION. THESE BIOTIC AND ABIOTIC FACTORS REGULATE POPULATION SIZE AND MAINTAIN ECOLOGICAL BALANCE.

REPRODUCTIVE STRATEGIES

SPECIES EXHIBIT DIFFERENT REPRODUCTIVE STRATEGIES CATEGORIZED AS R-SELECTED OR K-SELECTED. R-SELECTED SPECIES PRODUCE MANY OFFSPRING WITH LOW SURVIVAL RATES, FAVORING RAPID POPULATION GROWTH IN UNSTABLE ENVIRONMENTS. K-SELECTED SPECIES HAVE FEWER OFFSPRING WITH HIGHER SURVIVAL RATES, ADAPTED TO STABLE ENVIRONMENTS NEAR CARRYING CAPACITY.

HUMAN IMPACT ON ECOSYSTEMS

HUMAN ACTIVITIES PROFOUNDLY AFFECT ECOSYSTEMS COVERED IN AP ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE CHAPTER 3, OFTEN DISRUPTING NATURAL PROCESSES AND CYCLES. UNDERSTANDING THESE IMPACTS IS ESSENTIAL FOR DEVELOPING SUSTAINABLE ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT PRACTICES.

HABITAT DESTRUCTION AND FRAGMENTATION

DEFORESTATION, URBANIZATION, AND AGRICULTURE LEAD TO HABITAT LOSS AND FRAGMENTATION, THREATENING BIODIVERSITY AND ECOSYSTEM SERVICES. FRAGMENTED HABITATS REDUCE SPECIES' ABILITY TO MIGRATE, FIND RESOURCES, AND REPRODUCE, INCREASING THE RISK OF EXTINCTION.

POLLUTION AND NUTRIENT LOADING

POLLUTANTS SUCH AS CHEMICALS, HEAVY METALS, AND EXCESS NUTRIENTS ENTER ECOSYSTEMS THROUGH INDUSTRIAL DISCHARGE, AGRICULTURE, AND WASTE DISPOSAL. NUTRIENT LOADING, PARTICULARLY NITROGEN AND PHOSPHORUS, CAUSES EUTROPHICATION IN AQUATIC SYSTEMS, LEADING TO OXYGEN DEPLETION AND LOSS OF AQUATIC LIFE.

CLIMATE CHANGE EFFECTS

CLIMATE CHANGE ALTERS TEMPERATURE, PRECIPITATION, AND WEATHER PATTERNS, IMPACTING SPECIES DISTRIBUTION, PHENOLOGY, AND ECOSYSTEM FUNCTION. CHANGES IN CARBON CYCLING AND ENERGY FLOW AFFECT ECOSYSTEM STABILITY AND RESILIENCE.

CONSERVATION AND RESTORATION EFFORTS

EFFORTS TO MITIGATE HUMAN IMPACTS INCLUDE HABITAT RESTORATION, POLLUTION CONTROL, SUSTAINABLE RESOURCE USE, AND PROTECTED AREA ESTABLISHMENT. CONSERVATION BIOLOGY AIMS TO PRESERVE BIODIVERSITY AND ECOSYSTEM INTEGRITY FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS.
