Section Weighting

The multiple-choice and short answer sections together account for 60% of the total score, while the DBQ and LEQ make up the remaining 40%. Specifically, the multiple-choice section is worth 40%, short answer 20%, DBQ 25%, and LEQ 15%. This distribution emphasizes the importance of both factual knowledge and analytical writing skills.

Score Reporting

After the exam, scores are typically released several weeks later. A score of 3 or higher is generally considered passing and may qualify students for college credit or advanced placement, depending on the institution.
